Charlot has spent the past decade at Aspen Prize-winning Miami Dade College (MDC), where she most recently served as president of the Kendall campus, the largest of the college's eight. Previously, she was the dean of Miami Dade's Honors College, widely recognized as one of the nation's best. A graduate of Duke University and the University of Michigan Law School, Charlot held leadership roles at both New York University and Rutgers' law schools earlier in her career. Her time in law schools helped her see the value of career-oriented education, providing insights she has applied at the community college level.

An alumna of Aspen's year-long Rising President Fellowship, Charlot will play a lead role in developing strategies to build Aspen's network of community college leaders who have completed our fellowships, including over 100 presidents of community colleges that together educate over a million-and-a-half students. Charlot, who was herself a transfer student as an undergraduate, also brings expertise in one of Aspen's core priorities: advancing transfer student success and equity. While leading Miami Dade's Honors College, she developed a new equity pathway that increased the number of first-generation students who went on to attain a bachelor's degree.

Reflecting on the addition of Charlot to the Aspen team, David Jenkins, a senior research scholar at the Community College Research Center, said: "The Aspen Institute's College Excellence Program has been in the vanguard of preparing leaders equipped to enable community colleges to thrive despite the unprecedented challenges these important institutions face today. In her ten years at Miami Dade College, Charlot has championed the role of the college as a regional hub of equitable talent development that also provides a social mobility ladder for students and families.
